History of Avondale Estates Garden Club

Avondale Estates Garden Club (AEGC) was founded on June 10, 1931 when 34 women, at the invitation of Mrs. Germaine McGovern, gathered at her home at 22 Dartmouth Avenue. Shortly thereafter the women began to beautify public areas of the City.

The inaugural project of the Club was the planting of the Abelia hedge along N. Avondale Road. Labor was provided by workers from the New Deal's Work Progress Administration (WPA). AEGC's beautification program expanded to include enhancing the shores of Lake Avondale and the Bird Sanctuary beyond it.

AEGC activities extended beyond its neighborhood to include contributions to the plantings at the Governor's Mansion and Piedmont Park, and education opportunities for members and the public.

Today AEGC continues to follow in the footsteps of its founders by contributing to the beauty of our community as well as supporting a number of organizations that exemplify not only our Club's goals but also those of the DeKalb Federation of Garden Clubs, Redbud District, The Garden Club of Georgia, Deep South Garden Clubs, and the National Garden Clubs.







Okefenokee on Edge

Drew Kann is a reporter at The Atlanta Journal-Constitution. He is a proud graduate of the University of Georgia and Northwestern University. For more than five years, an Alabama-based company called Twin Pines Minerals has been seeking approval to mine for titanium minerals used in whitening toothpaste and paint near the edge of the Okefenokee Swamp, North America's largest blackwater swamp. Their proposal has faced intense pushback from environmentalists and some scientists, who warn the project could irreparably damage the swamp, which is set to be nominated as a UNESCO World Heritage Site. AJC's Drew Kann's presentation will explore my experience of covering this topic for the last years.

The Avondale Estates Garden Club Yard of the Month for July is 31 Dartmouth Ave, the home of Carolyn and Tommy Adams. The garden at 31 Fairfield Plaza looks established and serene. One could never tell that this entire garden, front to back, began from a completely bare site when Tommy and Carolyn Adams moved to their new home in 2020. Tommy was an environmental engineer and professor at the University of Georgia in Athens and brought his philosophy of a natural approach to soil amending to enrich their garden. The garden sits at a corner and enchants anyone with its artful use of plantings and open fencing that shares the beauty of the greenery in front and the riot of tall, colorful zinnias and beautiful sunflowers started by Carolyn.



The Avondale Estates Garden Club of the Month for August is 59 Berkely, the home of Kevin and Anne Moran. They have lived in their 1950's home for a little more than 20 years. The first year they lived in their home was spent ridding both their front and back gardens of ivy, which was climbing up every tree and every wall!
